Notes ... from the Playwright



Paul Ciufo ~ I first heard this marvellous story twenty years ago. As a summer reporter for The Lakeshore Advance, I was sent to interview Napoleon "Nap" E. Cantin, son of Napoleon "Nap" A. Cantin, and grandson of Narcisse. Nap had preserved the family history very well and spoke about it passionately. Narcisse and others at the heart of the story really captured my imagination and I was amazed that sleepy little St. Joseph had once been a boomtown. Also, there's something quite poignant about big dreams that fail. I empathized with the heartbreak Narcisse and many others must have felt. This could make a wonderful play, I thought.

In 2002 I finally got around to doing the research and writing. I'd been urged to pursue it by Joan Karstens who took her cue from her aunt, Pat Cook. Financial resources came from the St. Joseph & Area Historical Society thanks to a Trillium Foundation grant garnered by an application ably written by Pamela Hall-Grusska. I interviewed people who generously shared their memories and knowledge of St. Joseph including Velma Cantin, Jean-Paul Cantin, Marc Cantin, Jules Cantin, Phil Durand, Andy Rau, Adeline Denomy, Kathleen Rydall, Tony Laporte, Alphonse "Pitou" Jeffery, John & Peter Jeffrey, Florence Masse, Marguerite "Margie" Johnston, and Rosemarie Regier. Aimée Rau showed me a statuette of Brother André and impressed upon me how much he means to the community.

I spent hours in the treasure trove of an archive preserved by Nap E. and relocated to Hessenland Country Inn. Even more valuable than the charts and maps and ledgers and newspaper articles were the epic letters written by Narcisse to his wife Josephine, his son Nap A., and his business partner Oliver Cabana. The letters revealed what made Narcisse tick – his ambitions, his strengths, his values, his insecurities. Archivist Tracey Whitson-Bahro shared her valuable insights into the material with me.

Tony Laporte invited me to his home to hear French Canadian fiddling by Maurice Desjardine. Tony also loaned me Derek Blackburn's thesis proposal "The Life and Work of Narcisse M. Cantin, Early Promoter of The St. Lawrence Seaway". I read and re-read Joe Wooden's fine book, "A Drum to Beat Upon".

All of the above went into the first draft. Then we had public readings of the script with talented actors now involved in this production and others including Wes MacVicar and Gil Garratt. I listened carefully to everyone who offered feedback and attempted to make the script better, more true.

For years the play sat on a shelf. I bugged and bugged Duncan McGregor to direct the show and I finally wore him down. Duncan got the great idea to create an outdoor production with a big cast, so I did some major re-writing, attempting to make the play grander, more visually compelling. The Ontario Arts Council came to the table with funding to support the development of the script and production. Norm Tufts told me several key historical details I hadn't uncovered in my research.

Eric Coates and everyone at Blyth Festival – a cultural jewel of this area and indeed the country – offered plenty of direct help with "Narcisse". They also assisted indirectly as I improved as a playwright through re-writes, workshops and productions of my plays "Reverend Jonah" and "A Killing Snow".

The community jumped aboard with sponsorship and enthusiastic participation. Heather Klopp, Pat Rowe, Mike Miller, Frank & Liz Ihrig, Marc & Pauline Cantin and many others gave me a new appreciation for the importance of the story to this area. I was inspired all the more in my efforts to make the script the best it could be.

There are a few important things I need to state about the final script. I have taken artistic license to serve the dramatic needs of the play. However most of what is in the script is fact, or at least my best estimation given the available information. A notable exception is that William Walsh and his father are fictitious. The boy really cured of stuttering by Brother André was Charlie Rau; I heard the story from Charlie's sister Florence Masse who witnessed the healing first-hand. Foster -- the man who confronts Josephine in the post office -- is fictitious as well. Also, I don't know for sure that Nap A. Cantin struggled with alcoholism and was cured by Brother André. And I don't know that Nap formally and explicitly cut business ties with his father. I don't know if switching the ownership of properties to avoid creditors was Cabana's idea.

So to everyone who helped: merci beaucoup. To the entire community: I sincerely hope I have served your story well, and that you enjoy the play!

... from the Director



Time in this play moves forward from 1889 (the year of Narcisse Cantin's wedding to Josephine Denomme) to 1940 (the year of Narcisse's death) and to the present time.

The story is narrated through the memory of Napoleon "Nap" Cantin, Narcisse and Josephine's second son (1891-1953). In Act I, you'll find him talking directly to the audience, or being a silent member as he observes the scenes.

In Act II he becomes a living active character in the events of his parents. However, he is still able to separate himself from the action to make his comments. He is, in essence, our friendly travel guide through this adventure. He's the one who tells us when and where things are happening besides giving us his ever-present opinion.

The play moves quickly from setting to setting. We go from St.Joseph to Buffalo, New York; from offices to hotel bars; from outside the Balmoral Hotel to inside the Balmoral Hotel, from farmsteads to porches. The pace can be a little overwhelming despite our sincere efforts to keep everything clear.

Local events were never meant to be simple so for your reading pleasure (only if you get lost) we've included the list of scenes, places and approximate times.

ST. JOSEPH MEMORIAL PARK AND HISTORICAL

WALKWAY tells the history of St. Joseph through narrative and pictoral signage. The Park began with a request from St. André, known healer and founder of the famed Oratory of St. Joseph in Montreal. He requested that a statue honouring St. Joseph be placed in the Park. It was the early 1900's when he took a metal pipe and pounded it into the ground where the statue now stands. The statue was placed in the Park in 1972. A Provincial Plaque was also erected in St. Joseph Memorial Park honouring Narcisse Cantin (1870-1940). Free admission. Walkway stones for sale. Open year round, weather permitting.

Brother André - friend of Narcisse Cantin, visitor to St. Joseph, founder of the St. Joseph Oratory on Mount-Royal, Montréal, Québec and recently canonized (October 17, 2010), Brother André continued to visit St. Joseph until 1922.

Meet the Professional Team



Duncan McGregor - Director

Duncan has extensive experience as a professional theatre director and more recently with ambitious projects at Goderich Little Theatre, including a recent sold-out production *Dr. Barnardo's Children* and *Betty Bylorski Finds a Home*. These were both very popular historical epics with very large casts including a large number of children. Duncan also dramaturged and directed Tim Cumming's *The Tiger's Lion*, a story about Tiger Dunlop

and On Convoy, Ciufo's enormously successful play.



Ross Barnett - Technical Director

Before leaving Toronto to be a stay-home dad in Goderich, Ross worked as a lighting designer and technical director at a number of theatres in the GTA as well as summer theatres in Barrie, Grand Bend and Gananoque. Since coming to Goderich in 1994 Ross has been doing lighting designs for Goderich Little Theatre, Stage West, and Meadowvale Music Theatre and of course the many projects that Duncan comes up with both at the Livery Theatre and the Blyth Memorial Hall, and now a grave

yard. This is by far the most challenging lighting assignment Duncan has given me yet.



Sherri Milburn - Costume Designer/Set Decorator
A girl from Goderich, Sherri found herself fresh out of college working in the wardrobe department of the Stratford Festival. After 2 seasons, Sherri stopped to have a family, returning after 10 years to the comforting atmosphere of the Blyth Festival and staying for 7 seasons, even while moving to Woodstock. It was a short drive to The Grand Theatre in London and a new experience in soft props. A return to Stratford in decorating followed, furthering Sherri's education, which then benefited numerous pro-

ductions at the Woodstock Little Theatre and the Goderich Little Theatre. Sherri has found this to be both a privilege and a challenge to explore some of her local history by designing the look and feel of *Narcisse*.



Arlene Darnbrough - Musical Director

Arlene received her Associate of the Royal Conservatory of Toronto at the very young age of 15. Since that achievement she has been a musician and teacher along with being a registered nurse. In Goderich she founded Cactus Jam, an all-female band 18 years ago and was an essential part of the fundraising children's and adult plays for the Blyth Festival in the mid 90s. As the soundscape designer for Paul Ciufo's first play On Convoy and the music director for this past Fall's *Doctor Barnardo's Children*, both performed at The Livery Theatre in

Goderich, Arlene's playing and arranging talents have been much appreciated and admired by her co-artists and audiences.



Steve Allen - Stage Manager

Steve is an Honours Graduate of Sheridan's Theatre Arts - Technical Production Program. Experience includes: eleven years with the Celtic Roots Festival, many of them as a Crew Chief; Technical Director for The Livery Theatre in Goderich (Goderich Little Theatre); Board of Directors of the Goderich Little Theatre for the last 2 years; Stage Manager/Tech. for two plays with Duncan before (Doctor Barnardo's Children & Betty Bylorski Finds a Home, or Settling of the Great Canadian West); Stage Manager &

Technical Director for Warren Robinson's *How High The Moon*, an original musical about Goderich in the war.



Karen Stewart - Project Co-ordinator

As a project manager and administrative director with the Blyth Festival, Karen's experiences included managing large cast, multi-venue, complex productions - the Blyth and District Community Play (1993) and The Outdoor Donnellys (2001). Karen works now as a freelance project co-ordinator. She is the Past President of the Huron Tourism Association.


Capucine Onn - Musician/multiple:



The French Settlement

Within a decade or so of the Canada Company's first activity in the Huron Tract there seems to have been early visits to our Lake Huron shores by some of the French Canadians who a little later took up farms. Local tradition has Claude Gelinas, Abraham Bedard, and Baptiste Durand visiting the area in the late 1830's and being so impressed with the land, the climate, and the rich catches of fish that they returned to their home townships in Quebec convinced that a better life beckoned in the Lake Huron area. Their enthusiasm was contagious and a number of the people in their home rural areas also felt that the poverty on their small farms in Quebec offered them nothing except low prices for their crops, the threat of starvation, and no future. So, a number of families abandoned the small poor farms in Quebec and joined the hundreds of thousands of French Canadians who chose migration to various parts of Canada West, that is Ontario, and to New England as well as other areas.

Among the first to come to our Lake Huron area arrived in mid-July, 1846. Among the first groups to arrive included the initial group which spent their first nights and days on the beach, now called Ducharme's Beach. This group named the area Pointe-a-Bouleau. This group included Elie Ducharme, Christophe Ducharme, Norbert Denomme, Oliver Mousseau, Basil Geoffrey Basil Durand, Pierre Corriveau, Joseph Laporte, Pierre Masse and Francoise Papillon (Papineau). Other names which appear in the other early groups include Cantin, Desjardine, Tetreau, Gratton, Aucil, Etue, Charette, Ayotte, Gravelle and Brisson.

These and others became pioneer farmers on land which they acquired from the Canada Company for prices ranging from two to three dollars for an acre. At such prices the farms were necessarily small. They cleared the land; built houses and barns; planted crops and tried to make a life. Life was hard and the farms were small so that they were still poor but they persevered. Surplus grain was carried to Francistown a distance of 14 miles to the mill there in the north end of Exeter. Mills in Seaforth and Goderich were eventually patronized as well.

Food was often in short supply but the fish from the lake and wild fowl and game

supplemented the food which was grown. These folks suvived on their own ingenuity and with the help of neighbouring farmers. The French community on these shores has survived for 165 years but did not expand in numbers very much because many had to leave for the neighbouring cities and towns of Michigan and Ontario cities as well.

This French community makes up part of the ethnic settlement pattern that has characterized the south part of Huron County. Joining the French are German, Irish, Scots, English, and later Dutch and Belgian groups. Place names in Huron reflect this pattern, including one of the names of our area: French Settlement.

From that point, shipping would continue east on Lake Ontario to Prescott, where another canal would link Prescott to Ottawa. From Ottawa, via the Ottawa River, shipping would move to the St. Lawrence and Montreal Harbour by way of Riviere de Praires.

Cantin believed hydro electric power developments would advance along with the canal projects and create enough electricity to power southern Ontario's railroad system.

The feasibility for Cantin's project was based on: travel distance, freight handling, and quantity of shipping.

Inbound or outbound freight travelling the Great Lakes passed through an "unnecessary" 241km (150 miles) through the St. Clair River and Detroit River to either Lake Ontario or Lake Huron, which translated into 483km (300 miles) for round trips. Differences in water depth necessitated additional handling of freight, as it was unpacked and repacked between large great-lake ships to smaller canal boats and barges.

THE ST. JOSEPH STORY

- THE CANAL PROJECT

The first application to the Canadian Government for a Charter to construct a canal from Lake Huron to Lake Erie was made by Narcisse Cantin in 1898. The corporation was to be called the Huron & Erie Canal Company and proposed to build a canal running from St. Joseph to Lake Erie ending at a point between Port Talbot and Port Stanley.

Cantin's vision included a canal paralleling and located west of today's Welland Canal, entering Lake Ontario between Hamilton and Port Dalhousie.

"I saw that a canal between lakes Huron and Erie would be an economical proposition and would bring entirely into Canadian Territory the pivotal point of the greatest transportation and industrial activity in the world."

Canadian federal engineers were satisfied with Cantin's canal proposal. Unfortunately, Cantin faced political, financial and competitive challenges. For more information visit the website at:







Shoreline Livin'

Pioneer Life

The life of these French-Canadian settlers was typical of pioneers in other parts of Upper Canada.

They purchased land from the Canada Land Company for about \$3 an acre, which then needed to be cleared for crops and livestock. Homes were made of logs, using mud to block drafts instead of mortar and bark or small logs for roofing. Open-stone fireplaces were used for heating and cooking.


After land had been cleared and the soil broken using spade, plow or dragging heavy tree boughs over the ground, the first crop sown and harvested was buckwheat. Home-made sacks were used to carry harvested grain to McConnell's Mill at Francistown for grinding to flour. Francistown is now the north part of Exeter. This was a fourteen mile (22km) journey carrying hundred-pound (45kg) sacks. Generally, two men would take turns carrying the sack.

Buckwheat flour was reserved for special occasions, while the daily diet consisted of fish, wild fowl, game and berries. Even after fifteen years, life remained difficult. The settlers were helped by their English and German neighbours inland. Stories have been passed down of prosperous settlers bringing wagonloads of food to the poverty-stricken French-Canadians along the lakeshore.

By the 1860s, the acreage in crops had increased and the settlers took their grain to Seaforth or Goderich, where they would exchange it for goods or have it ground to flour for their own use. Like most pioneers, they purchased no more than necessary from merchants. As much as possible, furniture, implements, clothes, soap, candles and mattresses were home-made.

During one particularly bad crop year, known as the Famine Year, settlers were forced to survive on pigweed and roots, with several settlers actually dying of starvation. If natural food supplies (fish, birds, deer) had not been as plentiful as they were, this fledgling settlement would likely have disappeared.

These settlers left Quebec because of poverty. Their experience in the Huron Tract was not much different for at least 60 or 70 years. Small surpluses gathered from farming, fishing and home industry were sold in Goderich, Seaforth or Francistown (Exeter) – the nearest settlements of any size for 10 to 15 years.

Countryside and Coastline

Community & Social Life

Like many small towns, community and social life centered around the church. Dances with fiddlers and other forms of entertainment characterized the area. Folk songs and social customs of rural Quebec persisted for generations, such as the New Year's Day tradition of gathering in the father's house for his blessing.

Jobs were often turned into games. One story tells the need to move a large anvil from a barn in St. Joseph. Narcisse Cantin provided the amusement by offering \$50 to the man who could lift the 410 lb. (186kg) object to his shoulder (annual wages at the time were about \$453). There were several unsuccessful attempts, including one by a Black-Canadian man named Mousseau. Mousseau succeeded in getting the anvil to his shoulder, but the effort was too much and he dropped it. The anvil then crashed through the barn floor killing a calf below. Cantin paid Mousseau the \$50 and paid for the calf as well.




